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Introduction

Chunhui Children's Foundation is a non-profit organization providing caregivers with professional trainings in order to serve children in need. It has 2,000 "Chunhui Moms" nationwide who, systematically, scientifically and consistently, provide these children with the most needed family love and care.

Chunhui Children inherits experience from Half the Sky Foundation* ("HTS"). HTS was one of the first international non-profit organizations in China, which has been devoted to helping vulnerable children since 1998. Chunhui Children was registered in Beijing in 2012. It recruits and trains full-time "Chunhui Moms" at the welfare institutions nationwide to ensure individualized care for children. In collaboration with the Ministry of Civil Affairs, love from "Chunhui Moms" has changed the lives of over 140,000 orphans over the past 19 years.

Now, Chunhui Children is sponsoring and running programs in 87 state-run institutions in 27 provinces, municipalities and autonomous regions, as well as 46 rural program sites in Ye County, Henan Province. We are helping over 11,000 orphans under institutional care and rural left-behind children every day.

* Founded in 1998, it was named Half the Sky Foundation. The organization became one of the first registered foreign NGOs in China, along with Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and the Clinton Foundation. Now it is known as the OneSky Foundation, the international partner of Chunhui Children's Foundation.



Impact

Now, Chunhui Children is sponsoring and running programs in 87 sites in 27 provinces, municipalities and autonomous regions, excluding 46 rural program sites in Ye County in Henan Province. We are helping over 11,000 orphans and left-behind children every day.

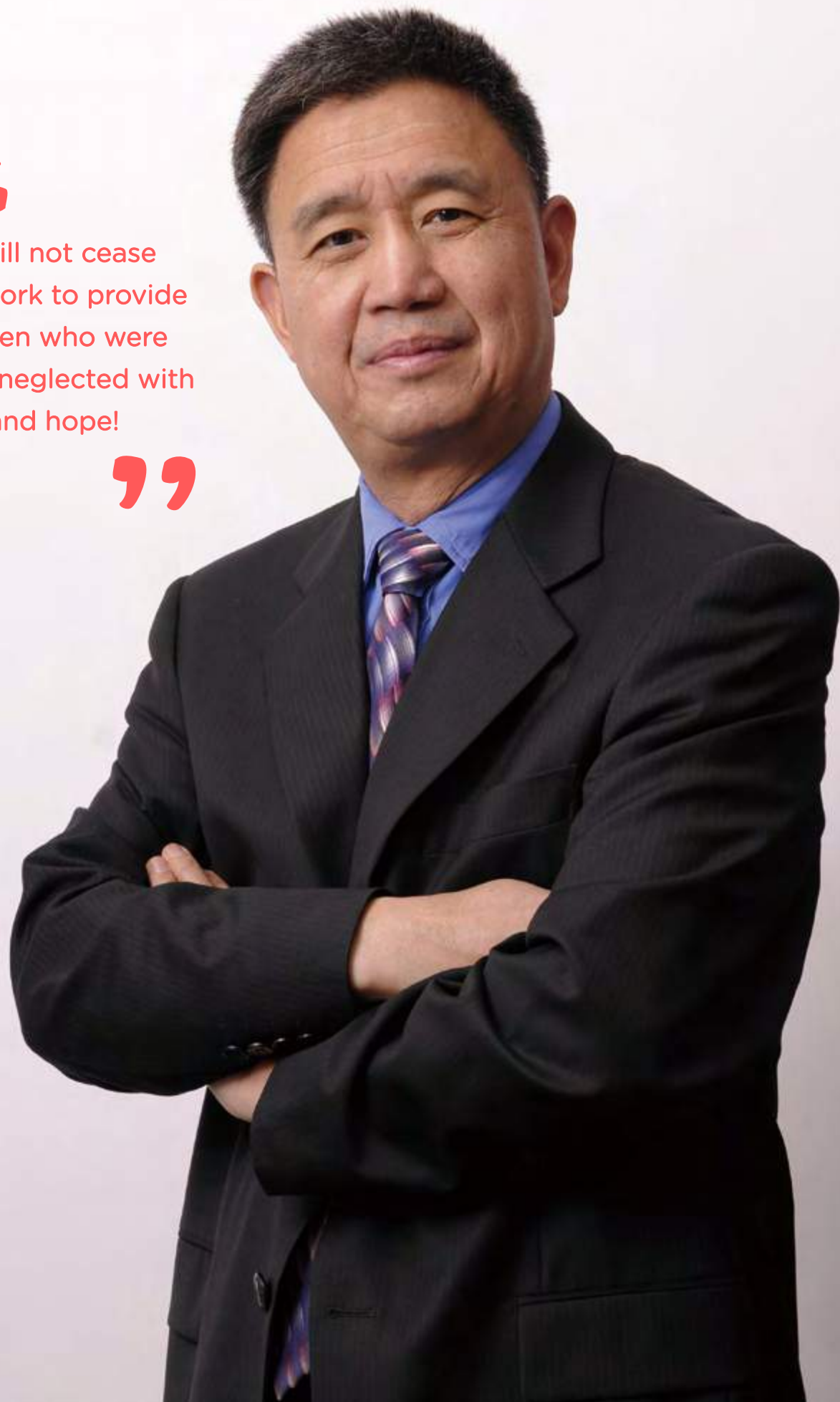

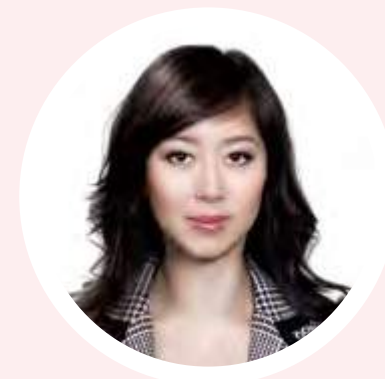

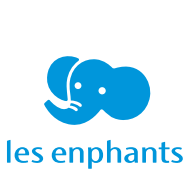

Chunhui's Heritage

Inheriting Half the Sky's programs, scientific and best practices, international management and financial transparency, Chunhui Children was rated 5A (highest possible) by the Ministry of Civil Affairs in 2015. The establishment of Chunhui Children enables Chinese corporations, local offices of foreign firms and Chinese individuals to invest in the future of the country's most vulnerable young citizens.

In 1997 an American couple, Jenny and Richard Bowen, adopted a toddler from a welfare institution in southern China. Seeing the remarkable change in her toddler and how one life could be turned around just by giving her a loving family, Jenny Bowen set out on a mission to raise more orphans grow up in love and care. She founded Half the Sky Foundation the following year in California, USA (a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization) to bring family-like loving care to children in need in China. Half the Sky Foundation is later known as OneSky Foundation.

Created by a team of leading children development experts and educators from around the world, Half the Sky's innovative curriculum has proven effective and is highly regarded by the Chinese government. In partnership with China's Ministry of Civil Affairs, Half the Sky's core work is operating its programs in government-run welfare institutions and establishing model children's centers and provincial training bases.

In 2008, the organization became one of the first registered foreign NGOs in China, along with Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and The Clinton Foundation.

Since then, it has become Chunhui Children's responsibility to continue and to expand Half the Sky's work in China.

In 2011, at the invitation of the Ministry of Civil Affairs, Half the Sky launched the national Rainbow Program to officially train and certify caregivers in China's child welfare system. Nevertheless, the ultimate goal has always been to pass the torch on to the locals. In 2012, Chunhui Children was registered in Beijing as a local Chinese foundation with its own board of directors and charter.

Challenge & Mission

From the moment a child is born, he/she needs a primary caregiver to fulfill basic physical needs, but more importantly, the child needs the caregiver to establish a stable emotional attachment. Scientific research shows that a child who is deprived of a loving caregiver suffer from a delayed brain development, which leads to various problems that surface when the child reaches adulthood.

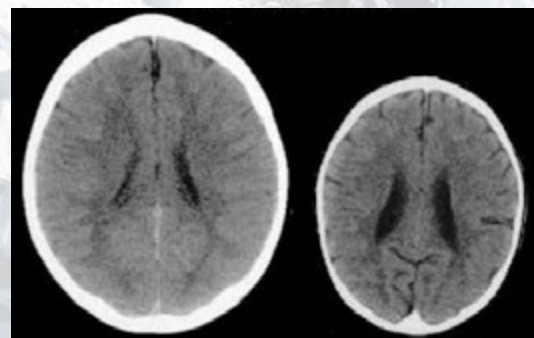

As a strong support of the government and government-run welfare institutions, we hire and train full-time caregivers to ensure that every institutionalized child has the best chance for development. The objective of Chunhui Children Foundation is to train professional caregivers to help children in our welfare institutions and family communities to fulfill their greatest potential, nourished in a loving and healthy environment.



Our Strategy

From the very beginning of our journey, our founder believed in working inside the system in order to change the system so that we not only change lives but influence generations of lives. In the past 20 years, we have always worked to maximize impact by focusing on leveraging our core competency --- professional development in training the caregivers. We have made significant strides along this trajectory, from working alongside Civil Affairs officials and orphanage directors, cultivating model orphanage centers for the entire province in almost every province in China, to becoming Civil Affairs partner to train and certify almost every single caregiver in the country.

In current stage of our journey, we are gradually transforming ourselves from an operating organization to an organization with both operation and training so as to accelerate our social impact and reach more children in need. With model centers now established across the country, we accept applications from child welfare institutions to bring necessary resources, especially our experienced team of trainers to help set up Chunhui programs in the institution. Our team of trainers will also be accountable for quality assurance and continuous coaching and professional support.

Chunhui's Focuses



To further expand our work to help the millions of left-behind children, who exhibit similar needs for loving care as children living in institutions, we have brought our work to 46 villages in Henan Ye County in 2016. There we focus on providing thought - provoking but simple, basic concept about child rearing to the caregivers, mostly grandparents, while offering them practical, easy-to-follow steps and tools to interact with their children.

With support from local government, we also built a training center in the county where people from across the county can come and learn.

Deeply rooted in science, professionally-developed content and approach, scalable training and systemic quality control, highly leveraged models and approaches have always been Chunhui's programming strategy. From government-run child welfare institutions, to rural villages, we make sure we change one life at a time, and build a sustainable system every step of the way.

In the future, given enough capacity and resources, we would like to expand our service to marginalized children in communities through our social enterprise with government purchase or private sector support and collaboration. It is a long journey, but "because of you, we are not alone"!

2016 Operation Report

Overview

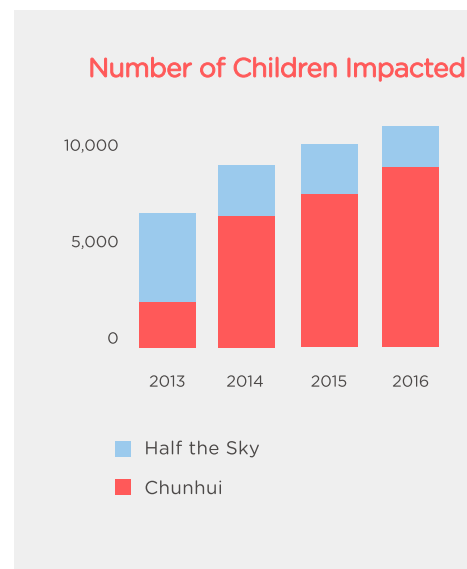
Chunhui Children, along with its international partner Half the Sky, continued its institution programs, Chunhui Medical, and village projects in 2016. Through these programs, Chunhui Children directly impacted 11,572 children and trained 1,990 “Chunhui Moms” and teachers. It also indirectly impacted 12,847 children and trained 2,383 staff in welfare institutions.

Program Development

① Orphanage Mode – Traditional Programs

In closer partnership with the Ministry of Civil Affairs, Chunhui Children continued operating six programs for children 0 to 18 years in 29 welfare institutions, which supported and trained 952 “Chunhui Moms” and impacted 4,271 children. Of these, 397 “Chunhui Moms” and 1,804 children were in our Chunhui Babies; 252 preschool teachers and 1,133 children in Chunhui Preschools; 40 “Chunhui mamas” and 368 children in Chunhui Youths; 237 “Chunhui Moms” and 968 children in Chunhui Families of whom 444 are receiving nurturing care and love in Chunhui Babies, Preschools and Youth Programs at the same time; 45 children and 6 “Chunhui Moms” with professional skills in Chunhui Special Education Program; 396 children and 20 “Chunhui Moms” in Chunhui Sports Program.

Chunhui Children was able to cover 75% program cost while the rest 25% was supported by overseas donors through Half the Sky Foundation.



② Orphanage Model – Seed Program

Since July 2014, Chunhui Children has been running 70 seed programs at 23 welfare institutions in 11 provinces. In 2016, we launched 25 in Zhumadian, Yulin, Beiliu, Liaocheng, Suzhou, Xinyu and Lishui, including 7 Chunhui Babies, 6 Chunhui Preschools, 6 Chunhui Special Education, 4 Chunhui Sports and 3 Chunhui Families, benefiting 1,803 children and training 398 caregivers.

③ Chunhui Medical Program

In Chunhui Medical Program, our China Care Home in Beijing increased 28 co-operating institutions and the number reached 205 in 2016. The Home admitted 318 children and 317 cases, of which 214 cases were in conjunction with the Ministry of Civil Affairs Tomorrow's Plan.

Moreover, China Care Home deepened the cooperation with Ministry of Civil Affairs. In August 2016, Chunhui Children won its first order of government procurement of services. Chunhui Children's wholly-owned subsidiary – Beijing Care for Children Philanthropy Development Center signed an agreement with Beijing Civil Affairs Bureau, valued at RMB 75,000.

In November, 2016, the 4th forum on assistance to children with serious diseases was held in Beijing Guobin Hotel, on which Chunhui Medical Program was chosen as one of “Top Ten Model Programs Offering Assistance to Children with Serious Diseases”.



④ Chunhui Village Program

“Chunhui Village Program” is our first pilot project in China’s rural area, including Family Skills Training, Preschool and Community Engagement programs. These programs give early intervention to children 0 to 6 years old. They aim to help China’s rural left-behind children in order for them to reach their full potential.

From 2015 to 2016, Chunhui Children rolled out these three programs in 46 villages of 15 counties and towns in Ye County, Henan Province. We recruited 314 local teachers and 22 front line management, benefiting a total of over 5,000 children every day.

China Development Research Foundation under Development Research Center of the State Council and Amsterdam Institute for International Development are monitoring and evaluating this pilot project for two years. After the evaluation, Chunhui Children will inform governments with our proven concepts and practices to duplicate this project in other rural areas. We hope to make this program sustainable and scalable.

⑤ Chunhui Training Program

In 2011, working with our international partner, Half the Sky Foundation, Chunhui Children and the Ministry of Civil Affairs started delivering training to those working at welfare institution nationwide, including directors, managements and caregivers. Until Dec. 31st, 2016, this training initiative had provided trainings in 24 provinces and municipalities, benefitting a total of 699 welfare institutions, approximately 13,466 staff and more than 60,000 children.

2016 Professional Development Update

In 2016, Professional Development Department of Half the Sky, the international partner of Chunhui Children, launched a series of new trainings, bettered the CH Trainer Career Development Planning, and Professional Trainings and Learning Regulations, which continued supporting Chunhui Children's professionalism in welfare institutions and village model.

From this example, we can conclude that this child reached 12 milestones within 12 months.

Chunhui Children has professional staff to analyze these data and make graphics, enabling front line caregivers to better understand and plan children’s development, and identify areas they need focus on so as to bring out the best possible potential in each child.

2. Training Materials Compiling

In 2016, Professional Development Department of Half the Sky continued compiling teaching materials for Family Skills Program under the Village Model and set about the Special Education Curriculum for Orphanage Model, in order to meet the need of both program models.

Village Model

Chunhui Children delivered Family Skills Training and Preschool Programs in 46 villages of Ye County, Henan Province. In 2016, Professional Development Team developed 28 lessons for Family Skills Training, with topics including communication and language development, non-verbal communication, building vocabulary, active listening in conversations, storytelling with young children, music and language development and so on. Till the end of 2016, 50 lessons of trainer guide and 54 teaching posters were finished for Family Skills Program.

Guide for Trainers Sample

Session 31: Non-Verbal Communication

Session goal: The goal of this concept session is to guide trainees in recognizing how children communicate non-verbally and what these communications could mean.

By the end of this concept session the trainees should be able to:

- List four forms of how children communicate without words.
- Give an example of what a child might be communicating using:
 - Cries
 - Eye contact
 - Facial expression
 - Body movement
 - Gesture
 - Touch

If trainees are reluctant to participate

If the trainees have not wanted to participate in activities in previous sessions, call out the name of certain trainees to come up and demonstrate. You could also hand out a card to each trainee before the activity begins and ask them to demonstrate what is printed on the paper.

Previous Session Review

On the wall you see the **Tree of Trust**. Move to the Tree of Trust. Last session we talked about a few key milestones in children's language development. You see these on the branches. These milestones show development in how children express thoughts and ideas and how children understand what others are saying.


Can someone tell me about one milestone your child has reached in language development and how your child is using that milestone? Listen to their responses adding information as appropriate.

We also talked about the importance of language development. Can someone describe how having good language skills helps a child? Listen to responses. Be certain they mention that having good language prepares the child for school and helps the child succeed in school.

on the card with your face or another body movement. I communicating? Listen to responses and if no one identify what is on the paper.

Who would like to go next? Encourage trainees to self demonstrate what is on the card without words and let the trainees identify what the person is communicating verbally. Continue until all the cards have been used.

As you can see, it is possible to demonstrate ideas and without using words. If you reflect back on your day even think of some ways you communicated non-verbally you came to this session.

Orphanage Model

With the number of children with special needs increasing in welfare institutions, Half the Sky began to compile teaching materials for special education. By the end of 2016, Special Education Team of Half the Sky had finished the chapters of Rights of Children with Special Needs, Types of Special Needs and How to Meet Them, Special Education Principles, and Observation and Documentation.

3. Training of Trainers

① For All Orphanage Model Trainers

With the number of children with special needs increasing in welfare institutions, Professional Development Department of Half the Sky focused on developing trainers' professional skills and knowledge of special education. To achieve this, Chunhui Children and Half the Sky invited Dr. Guorong Wei, Program Director and top expert of rehabilitation in China from Hong Kong Society for Rehabilitation, to help trainers with their rehabilitation skills and knowledge. Special Education Director of Chunhui Children, Prof. Haiying Guo, gave trainings on special education.

② For New Trainers

Dr. Janice Cotton, Chief Program Officer of Half the Sky, provided a 5-day training on Creating and Presenting Effective Training for 27 new trainers who joined Chunhui Children in recent years. They were trained thoroughly on Adult Learning Principles, Preparation, Implementation and Evaluation of Training, and use of visual aids, skills needed to make a professional trainer. All trainers were asked to practice in groups on the last day.



4. Online Community

Our online community website (www.1jiaren.org) works as one of the most important online learning and interaction platform for all caregivers and trainers. In order to provide better user experience, the website started to be upgraded in late 2016, and will be finished in late March, 2017. A user boom is expected. Please see below user data in 2015 and 2016:

Work with Children and Never Give Up

Xiaoxia Zhang, Chunhui Babies Program Mentor in Nanchang Children's Welfare Institution

After studying e-learning courses, we understand Down's Syndrome is caused by genetic disorder and results in hearing impairment, loose muscles and ligaments, difficulty in feeding, intellectual impairment, developmental delay and typical face features of a Down's.

Caregiver Ms. Wan is the Chunhui Mama of Mengmeng with Down's Syndrome. When Mengmeng first came to Chunhui Babies Program, he was one year old. But most of the time, he lied on floor mat quietly and had no responses to others. He could not turn over his body and kept clenching fists. It was also hard to feed Mengmeng, because with cleft palate he had trouble swallowing. Ms. Wan was worried.

After taking e-learning courses, Ms. Wan learned about the special ways children with Down's Syndrome develop and learn. She believed Mengmeng had his potential to develop. So an individualized plan was

produced.

At first, Ms. Wan built secure attachment with Mengmeng with her knowledge of responsive care learnt from e-learning courses.

She began to observe Mengmeng carefully and noticed Mengmeng looked at her a lot. So she insisted communicating with Mengmeng for one hour (half in the morning and half in the afternoon) every day. To make sure Mengmeng had sufficient nutrition, Ms. Wan gave him various pureed solid food that was easy for Mengmeng to swallow. Though Mengmeng usually pushed it out with tongue, she continued patiently and talked to him while feeding. After two weeks, she found Mengmeng able to look at her lips and smile.

Also Wan started to use what she learned about DS children to engage Mengmeng in activities. Not to be daunted by how Mengmeng was currently doing, she tried to open up more possibilities for the boy to progress.

Every day, Ms. Wan took time to engage with Mengmeng in physical activities. She would exercise his feet and hands, hold his hands for pull-ups, interest him in stroking and grasping toy swings, and help him sit up or hold head up while lying on his stomach with support of a back cushion or bobath ball. She held Mengmeng in arms with head upright to practice his strength of head and waist. A few weeks later, Mengmeng was able to lift his head while lying on the stomach, roll over his body and pat toys with hands.

Wan consistently helped Mengmeng with patience, love and proper methods. Two months later, Mengmeng was able to understand and respond to simple words. Mengmeng smiled when she said she was going to hold him in arms. He would open his mouth at Wan's words: "Mengmeng, it's time for lunch." Now, he is successful turning over, holding head up while lying on stomach, and sitting up for minutes with support. His hands are more skilled with small light objects.

Wan believes, she can learn more and help Mengmeng make more progress with patience and persistence.

Chunhui Children provide all the trainers a professional career development path: Professional Ranking System. This system will give trainers precise advice on career development.

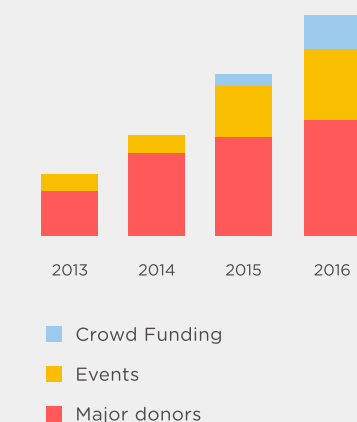
8. Professional Training & Learning Regulations

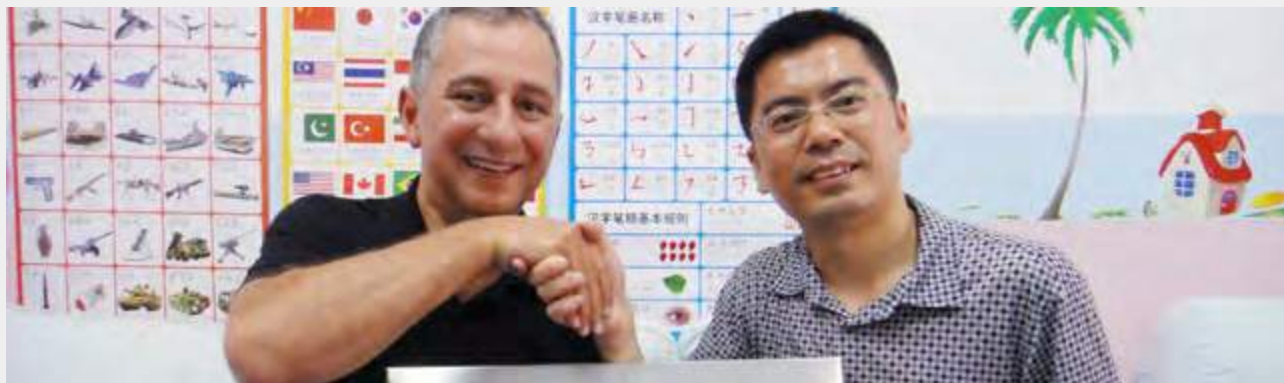
3. Hong Zhu, Director of Nanjing Social and Children's Welfare Institution, Jiangsu Province

Now You See Me



Liping was silent when the caregiver carried her into the Chunhui Preschools Program for the first time. If she was nervous, or even interested in her first day of school, she didn't show it. Her expression was blank. But that didn't stop her new Chunhui Mama from feeling all those emotions for her, emotions that went beyond the usual first day of school jitters. Because, for Liping, taking the leap to begin school was more than an educational milestone. It was something of a miracle.

When she first arrived at the small orphanage in China's Guangdong province, Liping wasn't expected to survive, let

alone go on to start preschool. Her vital signs were weak, one side of her head was missing hair and visibly dented, and there was a possibility that she had suffered brain damage.

Luckily for Liping she arrived shortly before Chunhui also arrived with its models for care designed for for hurt children just like Liping—children that most of the world simply did not see. When Chunhui trainers asked about the bedridden child, they were told Liping had just arrived at the institution and probably would not survive, due to her weakened state and possible brain trauma. Still, our trainers were determined to give her a chance. So after

receiving medical attention, Liping was allowed to join the preschool.

In the first days, she displayed little reaction to human touch and her tear-filled eyes made it clear just how bereft she was. She didn't play with the other children and refused to look at the Chunhui Mama when they tried to engage her. Yet, her determined Chunhui-trained Chunhui Mama, Li Huili, refused to give up.

She tried settling the withdrawn girl in a quiet corner on a calm colored blue mat, showing her a variety of things in her world...After a number of days spent repeating this routine,

something extraordinary occurred – Liping began playing with toys and, for the first time, made eye contact with Li!

Gradually, further encouraged by Li's smile every time she looked up at her, Liping began to interact with her Chunhui Mama, showing more and more interest in learning.

On one memorable day, just around the time her hair finally began to grow, right along with everything else, Liping discovered the mirror her Chunhui Mama strategically placed in her favorite corner. She took one look at that beautiful girl in the mirror and seemed to fall in love. Liping

saw she was somebody!

With new confidence, Liping began attempting to stand up on her own. The first time she did it, she burst into a fit of laughter, as her Chunhui Mamas and classmates cheered her on. "She has showed brilliant changes almost every day, thanks to the power of love, communication, and secure attachment," said Chunhui Mama Li.

Within a year, the entire staff at the orphanage was amazed by Liping's incredible progress. She started making friends and participating in classroom activities. These days, Liping continues to learn and explore

the world through art projects, music, reading, motor skills exercises and imaginary play.

Today, the child once thought not likely to survive, has left her blank expression behind, and finally and fully entered a world that typically developing preschoolers already enjoy.

And now, for those who had doubts, the child nobody really saw is there for all the world to see. Liping shows us every day just what is possible—that miracles wait inside every forgotten child.

The Story of A Chunhui Family in Nanning

Parents in Chunhui Families provide family love and care to foster children, which changes the children's lives. With thanks to Tencent News, this report from showcases the remarkable story of a Chunhui family from the Nanning Social Welfare Institution.

This is an undoubtedly typical family with a dad, a mom, two sisters and two brothers. Since 2014, cooperated partnering with Chunhui Children, Nanning Social Welfare Institution finds kind and experienced parents to care for orphaned children. Currently, there are ten foster families (Chunhui families) in Nanning. "The corporation we worked for closed, and our own children are grown. We have nothing to do, so we wanted

to find a job. Then we heard that the welfare institution was looking for parents to take care of orphans. We think it is meaningful. So we came here after discussing it with our children. It has been nine years since then." In 2007, Mr. Huaizhi Jiang and Mrs. Yingwu Song became "professional parents". In almost a decade, they have raised 9 children with special needs, writing down every child's progress on paper.

Currently, the couple is looking after four foster children. The eldest son is 16 years old, and the youngest is only 2 years old. "Our 'eldest son' Churong has hemangioma. He is obstinate. Our 'second son' Shuren is smart but sometimes naughty. Our 'third child', Haoxuan is a girl with cerebral palsy, but she is the strongest child. Our little girl Xuanshan has Thalassemia. She is shy." To Mr.

and Mrs. Jiang, these children are like their own. They know everything about them.

During weekdays, Mr. and Mrs. Jiang get up around half past six and prepare breakfast. At 7 o'clock, they wake up the kids, and help them wash their faces and brush their teeth. Then they send the children to school. In the afternoon, Mrs. Jiang goes to the school to pick up the kids while Mr. Jiang prepares the family dinner at home.

Xuanshan is two years old and also the youngest child in family. Mr. Jiang pays the most attention to her during meals. This couple's patience and love for their foster four children even makes their own daughter a little jealous. "This Chinese New Year, my daughter and son-in-law came to have the dinner on Spring Festival Eve. They saw us taking care of

these four small children which gave us little time to spend with them. My daughter got a little jealous and said we were not this 'nice' to her when she was a child." Thinking about that, Mr. Jiang could not help but laugh.

After lunch, Shuren cleans the table. He is trying to help his "parents".

After dinner, the children are playing at home. The foster family (Chunhui family) gives them the love of brothers and sisters.

Mr. Jiang told us that they have visited all parks that are free to the public in Nanning with their children. "Not only on holidays, but also on weekends or after dinner, we take the children out to walk around. We cherish the time we can spend as a family. Walking outdoors is also a good physical exercise for the

children."

To keep the record of their children's childhoods, Mr. Jiang bought a camera with his own money in 2009. Now they have a photo album from the past seven years. There are stories and memories behind every single photo.

There was a great news the afternoon we visited this foster family (Chunhui family). There is a couple from America who will adopt Xuanshan. This American couple has sent their photos, so Mr. and Mrs. Jiang can help Xuanshan become familiar with her new parents. They feel happy about this good news. "It is hard to see Xuanshan leave us. But we feel happy that she will be adopted into a good family. In America there will be better medical care and, from the photos, we see her new home is very beautiful.

That is a good thing for her." Mrs. Jiang said to us.

Every time a child is adopted, Mrs. Jiang cries so hard. This couple is very attached to their children. But when the day comes, they have to be tough and let their child go. Mr. Jiang massages Haoxuan's hand, and always reminds her to use her left hand more often.

It has been nine years now. Mr. and Mrs. Jiang are one of the most experienced parents out of the foster families(Chunhui family) and they love this job even more. "Our daughter is grown. There are always more children in need. We cannot experience this kind of joy anywhere else. We will continue this job." Mr. Jiang told us.

Love, trust and respect



I am from an orphanage in Shijiazhuang, Hebei Province. I grew up there. The orphanage paid my tuition fees until I graduated from secondary technical school. I tried to find a job, but they turned me down with different reasons. I worked as a manicurist for a while. Then I came to Shanghai Disney Resort with the help of Chunhui Children.

I entered Chunhui Children's program at about 21 years old and stayed there for one year. Chunhui Children is doing amazing work and has very nice staff and Chunhui Mamas. They are patient with me and my younger brothers and sisters when we were at the orphanage. Though we are not blood bonded, I enjoy family love from them.

Once I was in the summer camp held by Chunhui Children. I went to Beijing with many children, and Karen, who works for Chunhui, was our leader. Usually leaders I met before preferred to continually control the children so nobody gets lost. In contrast, Karen trusted us and was considerate. She let us decide where to go in our spare time and would plan in advance. I want to be someone like her.

I want to become a resilient girl with a strong personality. Growing up without parents, I understand I have to rely on myself. To do that, I need to be independent at first. It is not easy for a girl with special needs like me to take public transportation or find a job in China. I have to make ten times effort. Therefore, having strong personality and standing out at work is necessary for me.

Now I just had my one year anniversary in Shanghai Disney Resort. My colleagues are treating me like a normal person, not disabled. They used to be careful and afraid of hurting me with their words. But now, we are more like friends. I feel respected and live normally.

Story of Lele

Lele is a typical left-behind child with character flaw. He is raised by grandparents since his parents are migrant workers. Lele used to isolate himself and did not like to speak. Usually he cried to respond to others and even did not speak to his parents.

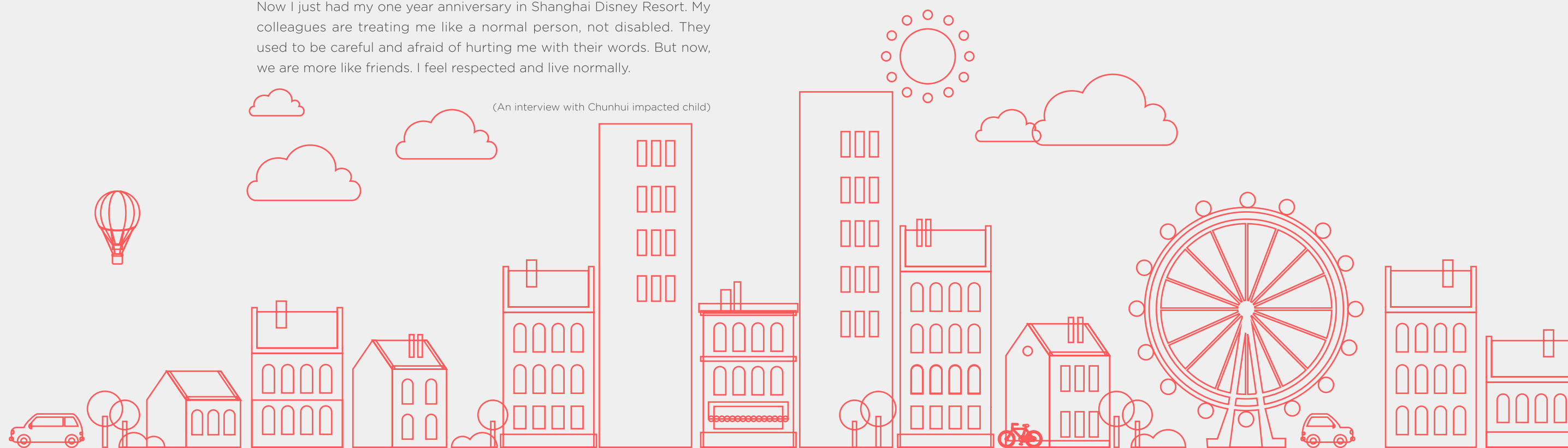
Lele's grandma was worried about him and brought him to our family skills center, where grandma learnt to use responsive care with Lele. Finally, with the help of teacher and grandma, Lele is changing.

In the few months in center, Lele follows teacher's movement with music, makes new friends, learns some simple expressions and gets to know his head, hands and feet.

His grandma is very grateful to our programs. She said, 'Lele is now more social than before, and learns some new words...he now speaks to his parents and greets teachers...Every day what he wants the most is to come to the center and I am happy about this.'

Not only his grandma, but his teachers have all seen Lele's progress. One day after school, I saw Lele looking at me when I was showing parents out. "Won't you come in?" I asked. Instead of answering, he offered me some oranges saying "They are for you"

Witnessing Lele talking to people proactively makes us believe that patience, responsive care and family love can always lead to miracles.



Story of Liangliang

Liangliang was left behind by his migrant parents when he was one year old. Spoiled by his grandparents, he isolated himself from other kids and did not follow teachers' instruction at the beginning. Sometimes he got angry easily and tried to hurt other kids.

"After staying in our programs for a while, he is more social now. The first day after Chinese New Year, he became a totally different person. He no longer keeps things to himself and is willing to play with other children in the class now," said Li, a teacher in one of our preschool programs.

The first day after Chinese New Year, Liangliang, who used to be reluctant to come, could not wait to see his friends and teachers so he rushed into the classroom.

What Liangliang enjoys the most is our outdoor gross motor practice. That is when he can play with his friends and run all over the place.

One day, all the children were learning to draw pandas and dragonflies. Liangliang did not start drawing. So the teacher talked to him patiently, "Pandas have a round head, black eyes and a fat body. Let me..." Without waiting for teacher to finish instruction, Liangliang began to draw on paper, saying "Pandas like to eat bamboo! I know it! I can draw a panda now." Liangliang used to refuse to draw unless the teacher helped him. But now, with simple instruction, Liangliang responds with interest and curiosity. We are all happy to see him try so hard and not give up so soon.



When a mom tells her child to leave...

I want my mom! I want my mom!

"I did not want to see the car leave, so I sat at the gate of China Care Home (CCH) and cried." Chunhui Mama Mrs. Zou recalls. "When the car was turning out of my sight around the crossing, I could still hear Xiaoyong crying, 'I want my mom! I want my mom!' His crying was like a knife that stabbed in my heart. Xiaoyong was in class at that time. I asked him to leave classroom and said 'Mom is taking you outdoors to play.' So he went outside happily with me. It was a farewell, I may never see him again."

Knowing her American mom taking good care of her rests my heart

"When Chunhui Children asked me to treat all children as my own, I said yes. But when any one of them is adopted, I feel like my own is taken away..."

"I can still recall the day my daughter Lily was adopted. She held onto my thigh and would not let go, crying out: 'I don't want to leave. I want mom; I want mom; mom...'. It was the last time I heard her call me mom." Chunhui Mama Mrs. Feng turned her head around, drying her tears. She continued, "It had been three years, and I still dream of her. I want to see her again so much. Then after three and a half years, her American mom took her back to meet us. I wanted to hug her and kiss her. But she did not recognize me. She hid behind her mom, playing on her iPad. She could not speak Chinese. Can you understand how that felt? It was like my own daughter no longer knows me! But I told myself, that is because her American mom is taking good care of her. Knowing she is well rests my heart."

The hardest part is farewell

"Sometimes I stay in the hospital for two weeks and sleep little. When I was extremely sleepy, I reclined against one side of the cot for some rest." Chunhui Mama Mrs. Cong has been working in CCH for six years. She said, "Seeing children living in typical families receiving loving parental care all the time, I feel sorry for my child". But it is not the hard part. The hardest part is farewell. When typical children are discharged from hospital, their mothers exult. Watching 'my baby' recovering, I am happy but also sad. I know it means the farewell is coming. During his recovery, I keep telling myself that he will be adopted by a loving family after he recovers and that is why I am taking care of him now."

Chunhui Mamas give family love and care to their children as if they are their own. However, Chunhui Mamas in CCH must let their children go. Even though they are sad, they know their child is in good hands and will be adopted by a loving family.



Story of Longyu



Longyu, 10 years old, was lying on bed, staring at the ceiling and listening to sounds from outside. As a child with severe cerebral palsy, it was impossible for her to play and run. The only communication between her and the outside world was through the crack of her door.

May 12, 2015, the first time we met Longyu. Our Chunhui Mama and trainer got down to her asking: "Longyu, won't you say hi to ayi?", nevertheless not expecting any kind of response. So it was such a surprise when Longyu struggled to produce the barely recognizable word "ayi".

When Longyu began her first class in our special needs program, she was not able to sit so had to lie on the floor mat. So her Chunhui Mama held Longyu in her arms and repeatedly called her name, "Longyu, Longyu, Longyu..." After quite a while, she murmured "Oh" that her Chunhui Mama almost missed what Longyu said. That was in a big room with eight children suffering from severe cerebral palsy. No sounds; no cries.. That was why a sound like that was so precious, a sound that voiced for every child in the room a burning desire to talk and walk.

After learning more about Longyu's situation, our Chunhui Mama designed an individualized training session for her. Apart from physical exercise, there was language training. Every day, her Chunhui Mama repeated simple words such as "I", "you" and "teacher" over and over



again, but with no effect. Not even a sound as simple as "ah" was heard.

After a while, she gradually built secure attachment to her Chunhui Mama. This sense of security and repetition finally helped Longyu start saying simple words. Her Chunhui Mama also seized every opportunity on Longyu's way to the classroom to introduce her to trees and flowers. Longyu showed her interest in knowing more new stuff and more words. Every time teachers hear her greet them, they felt proud and touched.

Longyu's desire to develop meets with more positive responses from her teachers and Chunhui Mama. When practicing moving her lips and tongue, she imitates what her teacher does. Her tongue is not flexible because of her physical condition, so it takes her longer to say one word properly. Nevertheless, she persists in practicing until her pronunciation is correct.

Longyu's persistence and progress make us believe that every child has potential, and it is natural for them to desire to develop and learn. What we need to do is to respect each child, respond to their needs, build a secure attachment with them and to provide them with an inspiring learning environment. Every child can be somebody.

The programs have achieved remarkable results, which is well praised in welfare system. Statistically, in every 10 adopted children, there is one under professional care of Chunhui. Life experience in Chunhui's programs helps double the chance of being adopted.

Chunhui's programs draw from the world's leading Western Reggio Emilia approach and the Chinese educational mandate, and are developed by a team of leading child development experts and educators from around the world. Chunhui provides orphaned children with scientific, systematic, consistent and professional care, with the help of "Chunhui Mama" employed by Chunhui and working in local welfare institutions. Now, Chunhui is running Chunhui Babies, Chunhui Preschools, Chunhui Youths, Chunhui Families, Chunhui Medical and Chunhui Training Program in institutions nationwide; it has Best Practice Childcare as its core theory, along with Child Memory Book, Child Development Checklist and an effective Training and Evaluation System as its tools, in order to keep the programs in all sites professional and consistent.

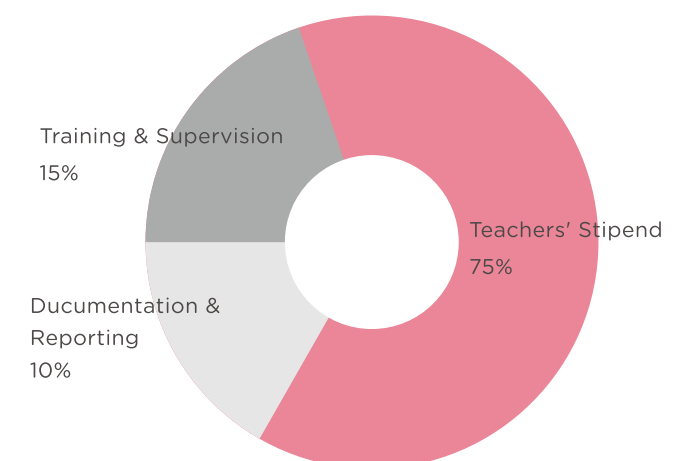

Full-time “Chunhui Mamas” recruited from the local community are taught the art of “responsive care.” Each takes care of no more than four children aged 0-3 years old, paying close attention to their needs and small changes, even during the most routine activities of the day. They learn to care and love these children as any parent intuitively would – singing, playing, cuddling, hugging and doting on them.



Chunhui Preschools

Locally recruited full-time Chunhui Mamas prepare 3-7 year-old children for mainstream elementary and special education schools. Trained teachers, who are university or normal school graduates, use a unique and progressive curriculum that blends principles of the Western Reggio Emilia approach to early childhood education with contemporary Chinese teaching methods. Special areas are designed for art projects, music, reading, imaginary play and developing motor skills. Like the approach employed in the Chunhui Babies program, teachers endeavor to understand the interests of each child before developing individualized curriculum and projects based on those interests. Each teacher takes care of up to six children.

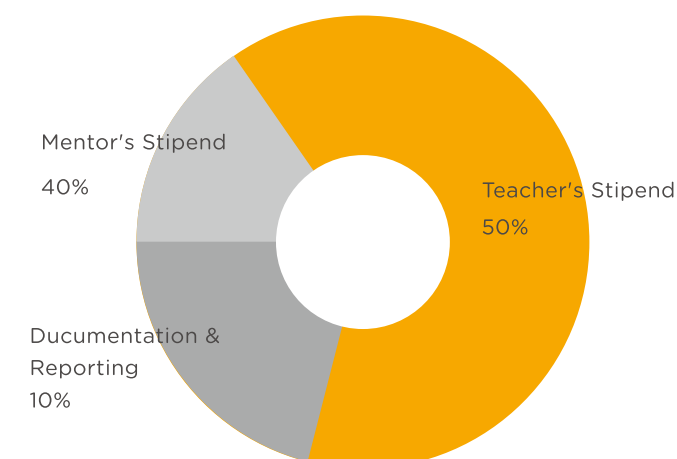

Adolescent years can often be a struggle, especially for those who do not have the good fortune of their biological family's support. Without proper guidance or encouragement, many older orphaned children give up on themselves. Our trained mentors spend time getting to know the older children and young adults in our program between the ages 7-18 so they can develop an individualized plan for each child. The plan may include music, art, computer or language lessons. It may include tutoring, sports or vocational training. It may even include college prep and support through university years. Our mentors are a constant presence in these young people's lives, providing personal attention and hugs as needed, teaching them that they can have the same big dreams as other children and supporting them as they go after those dreams.

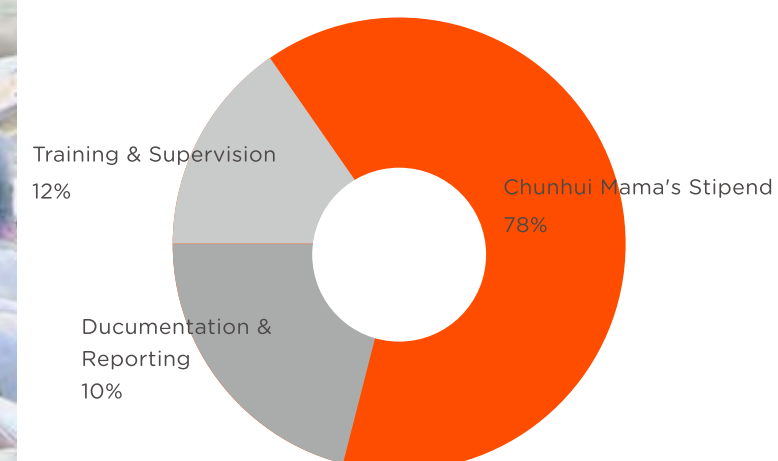

A family environment is the best place to raise our young. Unfortunately, some orphaned children with more severe special needs may not have a fair chance to be adopted. They too, belong in loving families. Therefore, each Chunhui Family includes up to four children who are unlikely to be adopted, a stay-at-home mom and a working dad. Our Chunhui Families live in apartments provided by the supporting institution. The apartments are on or adjacent to the institution's premises so our families have convenient access to the facilities and services available to them, including other Chunhui Programs. Chunhui Families' foster parents are long-married, empty-nester couples who are committed to raising the children until they are adults. Each apartment block is assigned a Chunhui supervisor who provides the necessary support and counsel to each family.

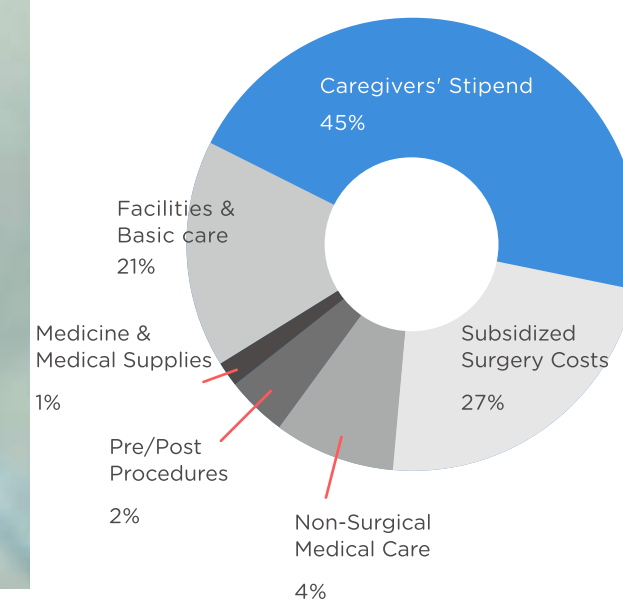


Chunhui Medical

Chunhui Medical Program — our Chunhui China Care Home (CCH) in Beijing provides individual treatment plans and loving round-the-clock pre- and post-surgery care for medically fragile children from child welfare institutions all across China. In partnership with government's Tomorrow Plan since 2011, if the child gets the Tomorrow Plan funding from the government, the surgery cost will be mostly covered by the Plan but the pre- and post-surgery care cost will be covered by Chunhui Children.

In addition to the highly skilled care staff that includes professional caregivers who are always on duty, each new little patient is assigned a Chunhui Mama whose loving arms and warm smiles provide support as she fights for her life in-hospital and while recuperating at the Home.



Chunhui Training

In Chunhui Children's vision, all children in China will have a loving adult, that they can call their own, committed and capable to cultivating their full potential.

As our best reward and recognition in 2011, the Ministry of Civil Affairs invited Chunhui Children's international partner Half the Sky to provide training for leaders and caregivers in all state-run child welfare institutions. The past 20 years' experience working inside child welfare institutions has taught us how to help them build the culture and mindset for "The Best Practice Childcare" systemically and sustainably. To date, more than 15,000 caregivers have been trained across China.

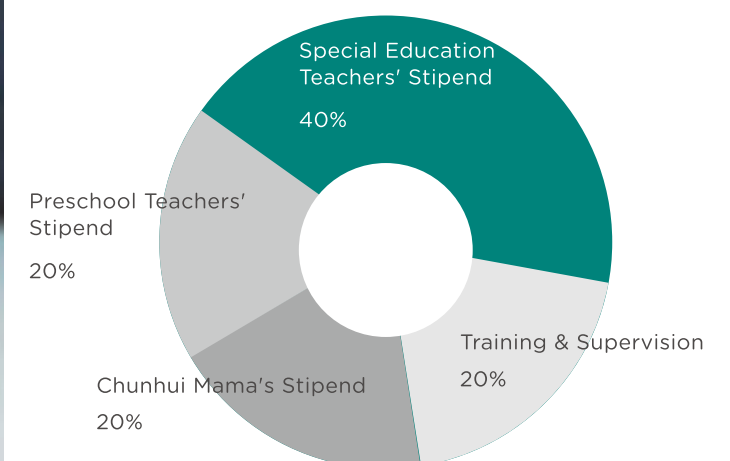

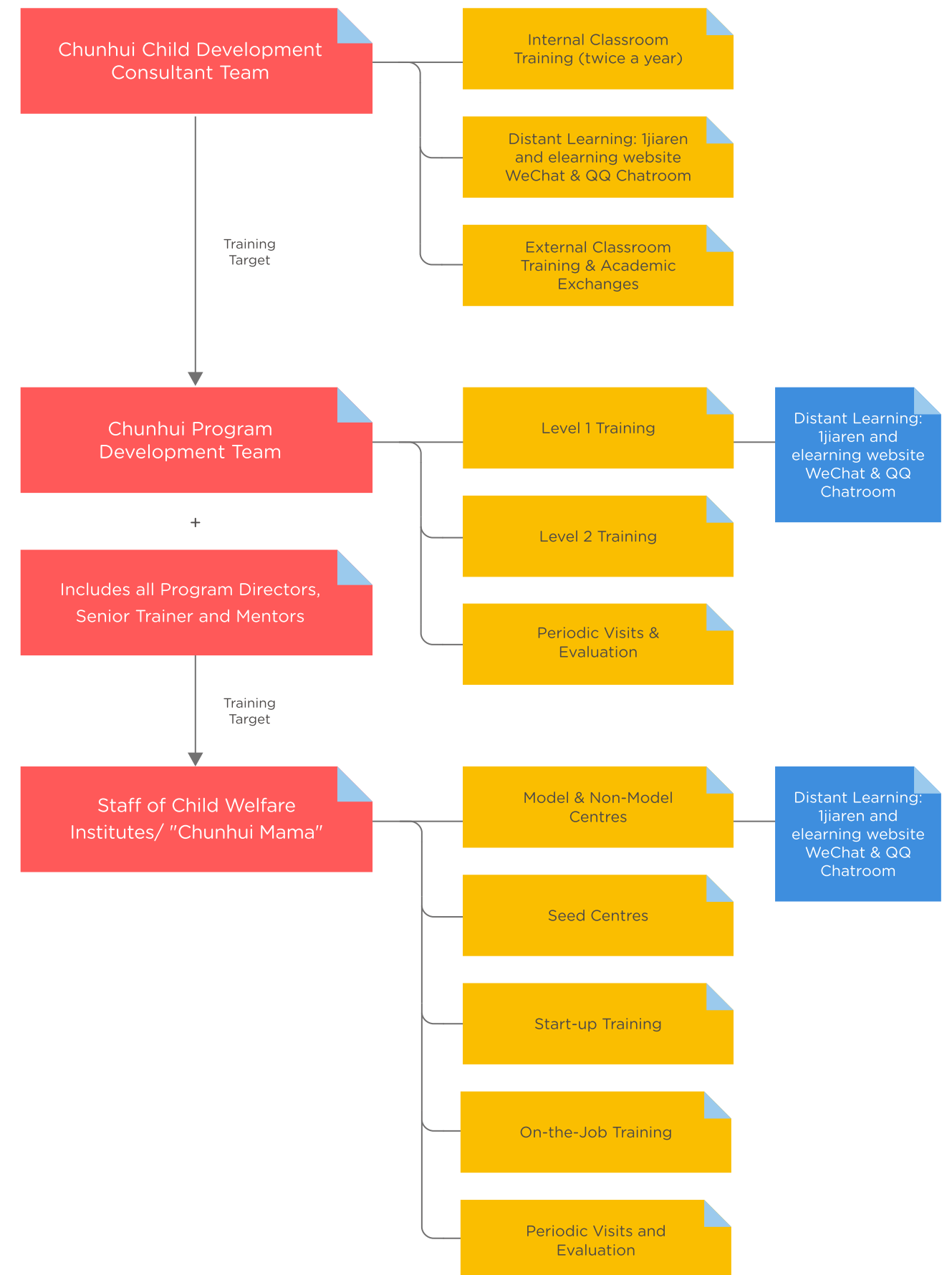
